Internet Safety:

This week all County Durham schools received several communications from the Local Authority about unpleasant APPs and programmes which children may be able to access through their PCs and devices out of school. We have been asked not to name specific APPs or programmes as this gives them publicity, however we wanted to raise the issue of safe internet use with you again. Whilst we know that you as parents and carers control what your children look at when they are at home and we fully respect that, we would urge you to regularly check the content that your child is accessing and that you are happy for them to see it. If you have not already done so, please check the parental controls so that your child is only accessing the material that you permit them to, and only talking to people that you are happy they communicate with. If in any doubt, block the content or contact until you are satisfied that it is safe.

It would be a great shame if children were no longer able to access the internet and all the creativity and enjoyment it can offer. With the right controls and checks in place, hopefully they will be able to continue to play, learn and communicate happily and safely online. This week, KS2 classes have been visited by our PCSO. They have been talking to the pupils (at an age appropriate level) about what is and isn't safe to do online, what is and isn't ok to share and who children can safely communicate with through their games, APPs etc. We value the work that our PCSOs team do with us to help keep our children safe and educated about how to use the internet and all that it offers, safely.

Attendance and punctuality update:

We continue to award the weekly trophy for the best attending class and individual pupils can collect a House Point each time they arrive at school on time. Termly 100% attendance rewards will also continue.

As registers are a legal document, the Local Authority has advised that our Headteacher must be satisfied with reasons given for absence in cases where a pupil's overall attendance is low. In such instances, some parents may be asked to provide medical evidence (e.g. appointment card) to account for their child's absence from school. This does not apply to children who are usually very good attenders at school but experience a short period of illness. If satisfactory medical evidence cannot be provided, the record of unauthorised absence will be referred to the Council's Enforcement team.
